

# **COLLEGE ANNUAL REPORT 2017**







#### Introduction

In recent our focus has been more explicitly on teaching and learning. While, anecdotally we have seen improvement, by 2017, there are clear signs of improvement in NAPLAN results and our 2017 seniors will do well. Our attention to explicit teaching, accuracy and precision must increase as we prepare students in Years 7 to 10 for the New Senior Assessment which begins in 2019.

Much has been accomplished this year. Some major and minor capital works, have sharpened up appearances to compliment the major building and facilities redevelopment over 2009 to 2016. The co-curricular life of the College has been full, with the Arts leading with *Rock of Ages*; and sport leading with individual and team achievements featuring heavily in every term. Music and Dance, IT and Science, and Public Speaking and Debating were also prominent.

## **School Renewal**

School Renewal plans and staff performance development processes complimented efforts in teaching and learning. They provided affirmation of, and challenges to, our efforts as individual teachers, middle leaders and senior leaders.

The school is looking good, from front office through the classrooms and grounds, to the back fields. The feel is good too. Staff morale is high, students are happy, and teachers and learners are working purposefully towards improved student outcomes and the New Senior Assessment.

At the same time the leadership and teaching staff are focussed on our seniors who will graduate in 2018 and 2019. They will enjoy both the advantages the OP system provides and our faithful efforts to ensure they achieve their best possible results for their futures.

#### **Teaching and Learning**

We explicitly moved to challenge student engagement in 2014. This followed the challenges presented in the research of John Hattie. the Heads of Faculty determined that a whole school approach to teaching and learning would be the basis for their work with staff as we sought to increase every student's engagement. Not all agreed, however, change was necessary and inevitable.

2015 was an interesting year, but Robert Mazzano's nine design questions for pedagogy were established as principles for high quality teaching and learning. We witnessed particularly beneficial change for the new Year 7 and new Year 8 students. It was also true that many teachers were asking classes, right through to Year 12, to line up and smarten up in their presentation before entering class, as teachers reclaimed authority with the implied message 'You're here to learn'. Across the staff, teachers have made significant changes to their practice to try to improve student engagement and their impact.

## **Excellence in Teaching and Learning**

In 2017 the project is having a good effect. Teacher collaboration, with group marking of student writing is promoting professional conversations. Pair-wise discussion and resolution of anomalies in teacher grading of de-identified individual work has been a central element. In 2016 and 2017 staff have devoted considerable time to this. The use of an eight criteria marking schema, which is referred to as the Writing Analysis Tool, sharpens the learning focus and the feedback students receive.

The intense experience of marking deidentified student work and the subsequent dialogue between teachers about individual student's work helps the teachers clarify the strengths and weaknesses in students writing. This improves feedback to students. This collaborative work is renewing practice and engaging learners and is vital to maintaining and improving student outcomes. It is more important than bricks and mortar.

### Teacher Performance Development & Middle Leader and Senior Leadership Appraisals

Each year staff development includes formal processes teachers. For Middle Leadership (Heads of Year, Heads of Faculty and Coordinators) an appraisal is required every three years, and for Senior Leadership every five years. Teacher performance development includes goal setting, linked to the College Action Plan, an interview with a member of the Senior Administration and the review at years' end. Middle Leader appraisal is more rigorous and all Middle Leaders completed their appraisal this year. The process involved preparation a selfreflection report on the role against the duties and responsibilities of the position and the goals for the period. Members of the faculty (curriculum leaders) and members of the pastoral team (year to level leaders) were invited to provide their evaluation feedback (strongly agree to strongly disagree) on performance against the duties. An appraisal interview with members of Senior Administration for 23 Heads of Department and 12 Heads of the Year followed. Each middle leader received a written appraisal evaluation which included commendations and recommendations.

The teacher performance development process and middle leader appraisal process are intended to align College goals and priorities, encourage active and innovative teaching and leadership and allow for formal recognition and suggestions for improvement. Mrs Dolores Maitland, Assistant Principal Religious Education, completed her senior appraisal this year. In this role Mrs Maitland is responsible for the Religious Education Program and the Religious Life of the School. Our efforts in both these areas was evaluated and validated by an external panel of BCE staff and APREs from similar schools in 2016.

We thank Dolores, our middle leaders and teachers for their good work and professional teaching and the generous contributions they make to the many cocurricula activities and to the religious life of the school.

#### **Capital Works**

The College has completed significant capital works. The substantial \$360,000 staff car park and service road connection from the rear of the school to the church car park was the major capital project this year. This resolved waste disposal and a number of other service issues for the College. It has also provided the opportunity to reinstate the Agricultural Science greenhouse, provide areas for garden beds and to create a productive environment for the students' practical work. The College contributed one-third of the cost to the church car park and set down/pick up facility. Our contribution of \$387,134 was independently assessed by a private Quantity Surveyor. A Memorandum of Understanding now sets out our rights of access to this facility. As a result our carparking and traffic issues of a morning and afternoon have now been resolved.

Minor capital works included the removal of the final asbestos material in the College with allocated funding from BCE. In doing so, we took the opportunity for a minor refurbishment of the A Block classrooms in the winter break. We also upgraded the AV systems in A Block. The upgrade to AV systems had begun in the E Block over the Christmas break and M Block AV systems were upgraded in the September break. In each block a 'repair and repaint' has been done to refresh and brighten the rooms.

Initial major work on the College ovals followed the rehabilitation of the northern most fields. These fields have responded well to subsequent attention. The near fields, adjacent to the tennis courts are also improving with attention, and improvement of the fields remains a significant ongoing capital cost each year. As part of this priority, the cricket pitch, the long jump and the triple jump run ups and pits have been replaced.

These ongoing minor capital programs are complimented by the focus that our grounds staff have on lifting the presentation of the College. They work hard and take pride in what they do. Whether it's the Franciscan Centre, the MacKillop buildings, the western carparks set down areas, the verges to the ovals or even older gardens, the ground staff have given College landscaping the lift needed to raise the standard of presentation of grounds and facilities.



#### **Parents and Friends Association**

The P&F has expressed support for completion of cover and connections between the Franciscan Centre, MacKillop Buildings and the Admin buildings. They are also positive about the need to refurbish and air-condition E Block. Consequently the College has not asked for funding support for the significant capital works this year. The College Educational Brief will be updated to inform planning for this significant work to which the P&F will make a significant contribution.

As in previous 'Fete' years, a number of parents joined the Combined Schools Fete Committee that has met from early March through to October to plan and prepare. The College and Primary School P&F will share the proceeds from this wonderful community event. Our appreciation goes to the Committee, stall convenors, Ms Tracey-Leigh Dean, and Mrs Karen Harrison, Mr Paul Brooks, ground staff and volunteers.

Throughout the year the P&F also received requests for subsidies from quite a number of individuals and College teams. Subsidy of \$50 is available for students representing the College at state competitions. The subsidy rises to \$100 for national levels. An increasing number of sports has added to requests for subsidies that were approved this year. Though small compared to actual costs, these subsidies are much appreciated by families. These students' and teams' achievements are celebrated by the community through assemblies and the newsletter. Thank you to Ms Grace McLintock (President), Mrs Tracy Fitzpatrick (Vice President), Ms Nicole Modini (Secretary), Lajos Csiki-Bege (Treasurer) and the executive.

#### Governance

Marymount College is owned by the Burleigh Heads Catholic Parish. Bishop Ken Howell, as Parish Priest and now Father Stanley as Parish Administrator are assisted by the Marymount Schools' Advisory Council. Council monitors financial performance against planning and budgets. Members include; Chair, Mr Matt Kennedy; Parent Representatives, Mrs Grace McLintock (College P&F President) and Mr Anthony Touzell (Primary School P&F President); Staff Representatives, Ms Shona Press and Mr Tony Barron; Parish Finance Council Representatives; Mr Jim Littlefield, Ms Mary Hiscox and Mr Tim McMahon.

Father Morgan Batt will take up his appointment as Parish Priest from November.

The College is administered by Brisbane Catholic Education, with whom all staff are employed. Many BCE services are provided through the BCE Service Centre at Springwood, from where accountability is overseen by Mrs Annette Duffy, Area Supervisor.

Our commitment to teaching and learning lies at the heart of everything we do at Marymount College. Our goal is to encourage each student to reach their potential by striving for excellence in all that they do. We support them in this by providing the best possible resources, both human and physical, and by building constructive relationships between staff and students. When students commence high school we focus on developing independent, self-disciplined, self-aware, resilient and lifelong learners in a positive environment.

**Junior Secondary** 

This year we have continued our focus on Excellence in Teaching and Learning across the school. Learning Teams, comprising of core teachers met regularly to review student data and progress, and to plan further learning for individuals and classes.

Digital Literacy is now embedded in the College with coding and robotics providing opportunities for academic extension in and out of the classroom. This year we had a record number of teams compete in the Queensland Robocup State Championship with two teams making the final. Furthermore, our students excelled in Science and our parents and the wider community were able to share in student's success at our annual Science night. The winners on Science night were entered into the Griffith University Gold Coast Science competition where Marymount won best Middle years school. In addition, our annual Night of Living History is a showcase of our students' ability to research Historical figures and be creative with their presentations on the night.

Marymount performed above the Australian average in Year 7 and year 9 across all areas of NAPLAN. This was our goal when we introduced our Whole School Pedagogy Plan at the start of 2015. Our belief was that a systemic and collaborative approach by teachers would lift the application, accuracy and precision of students in their work. Results are detailed below. Compare these with Appendix II 2016 results.

These are significant positive results that show our current Year 9 students above the mean Australian scores in 2015 and 2017. Further, the growth in their scores was greater than the growth in scores for Australian students in Reading, similar in Writing and equally high in Numeracy. With our commitment to NAPLAN and resultant higher participation rates than Australia and QLD, these are very solid results, of which students and staff should be proud.

## **Senior Schooling**

At the Senior Information Evening in February, we confirmed with parents that senior students needed to focus on their Academic Pathway. That is because the data each year increasingly indicated that students with both academic and VET options were under performing in the academic pathway. Both Year 12 and Year 11 students have received this message this year. Indeed, the New Senior assessment from 2019, while retaining VET options, encourage academic students to travel the academic pathway. We have similarly encouraged our current year 10 academic students to do the same as they chose subjects for Year 11 in 2018

With 2016 results (Appendix II) below expectations, we sharpened our attention to accuracy and precision in course work and assessment for seniors this year. At the same time, QCS Test preparation was tightened, attendance and commitment closely monitored, and direct feedback provided to students. The QCS Test examines capabilities of students to increase their focus and motivation. While many responded, others chose to focus on their VET pathway. Consequently, we expect both academic and VET results to be improved.

Parents were appreciative of the frank discussion of these matters, the clarity of the advice and assistance this provided as they advised their son/daughter. Year 10 students, choosing Year 11 subjects for 2018, found the impact of firm pre-requisites for academic subjects quite challenging as they were making selections. Quite a number of these students are working very hard in Semester Two to ensure they meet the necessary pre-requisites by the year's end.

We were pleased with the introduction of a number of new VET subjects this year through our renewed partnership with QLD TAFE with more definite academic and VET pathways, the determination for quality academic work is matched in our determination for quality VET programs and program delivery. With 41 school based apprenticeships or traineeships and 96 Certificate I, II or III qualifications achieved by students our teachers, partner RTOs and the College Careers office continue to provide rich VET options for our seniors.

#### The Religious Life of the School

Every aspect of life at Marymount College is permeated by its Catholic Identity, from the physical environment to the classroom tone and in every aspect of the life which is lived here.

The distinctive character of the College is noticeable on arrival as the statue of Mary, with outstretched hands, seems to offer a personal welcome. Reception staff are similarly friendly and helpful. Many prospective families have expressed their appreciation of these things when attending the popular School Tours and for the opportunity to see, for themselves, authentic interactions between teachers and students in real time and the state of the art learning environments and facilities.

The school year begins with Mass for the staff of the College and Primary School and the remainder of the day includes Religious Education Professional Development for all. In January of this year, Father Richard Leonard, a Jesuit priest spoke to staff on the mission and identity of the Catholic School and called us to our mission and purpose for those we teach, challenge and transform in the course of their journey through Marymount College.

Religious Education's two-dimensional approach includes teaching people religion and teaching people to be religious thus, as students engage with both of these they are challenged to be cultural agents in the light of the Gospel; authentic witnesses to the mission of Jesus Christ in the world today. The Religious Education programs and activities are responsive to religious diversity while being faithful to the Catholic Christian identity of the school.

The teaching and learning of religion operate from an educational framework which is organised into four strands: Sacred Texts, Beliefs, Church and Christian Life. Each of these has its own distinct body of knowledge, and the teaching and learning program integrates and balances all four strands which embrace a Catholic Christian worldview, reflect the educational philosophy, organisation and rigour of other learning areas and align the teaching about religion and the Religious Life of the School.

The dimension of the Religious Life of the School is aligned with the College Mission Statement and the charisms of Mary Mother of Jesus and St Francis of Assisi. These are concerned with how we relate to each other in formal and informal situations and can be identified in the tone experienced as one moves around the campus: friendly, respectful, polite, helpful, supportive, encouraging. It can be seen in parent, teacher interactions and involvement in community events such as the Spring Fete, the Art Show and the P&F BBQ at the start of each year.

It is also identifiable in the many ways we are "religious". This includes the Year 11 and Year 12 Retreats and Years 8, 9 and 10 Reflection days, which are a long-standing tradition of the College. These rely on the support of many staff in order to happen. Our prayer life begins with morning prayer in PC Class and also includes the Beginning School Year Liturgy, the College Anzac and Remembrance Day liturgies, Ash Wednesday and Easter Liturgies, College and Year Masses, Year 12 Graduation Mass, Social Justice and Outreach programs. Families Back on Track sees a bus load of students set off once per month to spend the afternoon playing with a sizeable group of very disadvantaged children, enjoying craft activities, reading stories, face painting, cooking up a sausage sizzle, eating rather large ice creams and having a lot of fun at the same time. Small groups of senior students, accompanied by a teacher will attend Rosies three or four times in a semester. The College Interact group's program is integrated with the Social Justice activities, and a small group of students enjoys involvement in the Smith Family's Buddy to Buddy Reading program. Other smaller projects in the past year have included a collection of personal hygiene items for the Prison Gate Ministry and letter writing for the Kairos Ministry which works in prisons.



Fundraising for Project Compassion, St Vincent de Paul, Catholic Mission and Rosies and responses to natural disaster appeals are big-hearted and generous.

A particular highlight of 2017 was the new College song, composed by Mr Peter Shaw and sung for the first time at the College Mass on the feast of Mary, Help of Christians.

In the September holidays, the College's second immersion saw three staff and five students travel to Timor Leste for ten days, while ten students and two staff attended the Ignite Youth Conference.

The completion and blessing of the Mary Mother of Mercy Church was a significant event of this year. Being so close to the campus its presence provides for many new learning opportunities and prayer celebrations can now be held in the sacred space. A growing number of students have become familiar with the various appointments of the church building itself, something of a novelty to many of them. The early Mass on Tuesday allows teachers and students the opportunity to attend Mass before school while the Friday noon Mass may be attended by class groups from time to time. In August, the Catholic Mission Mass, co-hosted by the College and the Primary School and celebrated by recently ordained Bishop Ken Howell, was attended by representatives from thirteen Gold Coast schools. A solid number of students attend the Parish Youth Mass each month. We look forward to our upcoming Year 12 Graduation which will be celebrated in the church with a Mass.

Religious Education at Marymount College is dependent on the witness and example of parents, staff and students. We teach them about God and how to pray and nurture their spirituality. We rely on the shared belief that each person is made in the image and likeness of God and our purpose is to love God and one another so that they and we might have life to the fullest. Special thanks to Fr Stanley Orji, Parish Administrator, for his generous and enthusiastic support of the Religious Life of the College and celebrating Mass with each year group. Thanks also to Mr Paul Faughey and Ms Jodie Young for their generous support with music and choir for all College liturgical events and Year Masses, and Mr Peter Shaw for the College song. Thanks to Mrs Dina Serong and the Religious Education teachers for their dedication and hard work throughout the year. Thank you to Mr Edwin Pereira for his ministry to students and contribution to Social Justice activities, to Mr Chris Murphy and Ms Jan Delves for their involvement in Families Back on Track, to all staff who have attended Rosies and Vinnies Sleepout and visitation at Oznam Villas. Thank you to Mr Kyle Connor, Ms Lorena Vine and Mrs Cathy Cooper for accompanying the students to East Timor and thank you to Mrs Kylie Mathers for organising the Timor Leste Immersion and accompanying students to Ignite. Thank you to all staff who have attended Year 7 Camp, Year 11 and Year 12 Retreats and staff involved in Interact. Thank you to all support staff. The contribution of each of these to the Religious life of the College is immeasurable and so very generous.

#### Pastoral

2017 has seen the implementation of the renewed Pastoral Program for each year level. Much work has gone into ensuring that the Pastoral Program is continually developed in order to meet the needs of our students and families as they progress through early adolescence into young adulthood. The Pastoral Program recognises that each student needs to develop socially, emotionally and spiritually as they make their way through school life and into life beyond the school environment.

Each year level is led by a Pastoral Coordinator and Assistant Pastoral Coordinator. The students also have 10 Pastoral Teachers who meet with and work with their Pastoral Class every day. This allows for a bond to be made in order to build trust in the teacher – student relationship and to allow the student to feel wanted and welcome here at Marymount College. Each year level is also very well supported by our excellent team of Guidance Counsellors and individual student learning is targeted by the Support Teachers Inclusive Education (STIE) team.

The Year 11 Peer Support program and the Student Teacher Advisory Council continue to bring different year levels closer together. The Year 11 Peer Support students are running study/homework classes for Year 7 students during lunchtimes every Monday which is giving the Year 7 students a great insight into study techniques as well as the opportunity to work with older students. The Student Teacher Advisory Council continues to give each year level a voice as each year level has two representatives who meet fortnightly with members of administration as well as Assistant Pastoral Coordinators. Information from these meetings is filtered back to the individual year levels which has proven to be very successful.

Marymount College continues to be committed to promoting lifelong and life-giving learning. The Pastoral Program delivered to our students reflects the Gospel values found in the Mission and Vision Statements of Marymount College. Each student is valued and we strive to demonstrate respect for the dignity and uniqueness of the individual person, as we are all made in the image of God.

Junior Curriculum Music continues to be shared by Ms Jodie Young and Mr Paul Faughey. Year 7 students have the opportunity to study music for one term, as part of their elective rotations; Year 8 students are able to choose music as an elective for study, lasting for one semester; Year 9 allows students to engage in the music curriculum at a deeper level, by studying the subject for a full year, as do students in Year 10.

**Music and Instrumental Music** 

The Senior Curriculum prepares for the biggest changes that the Queensland syllabus has seen in over a decade. The current Year 9 students will be the first year level to progress through their senior curriculum under the new syllabus. The Marymount Music Department is excited to implement these changes, by giving students a wide range of music topics to study, that will be standardised throughout Queensland.

Marymount College also offers the highly regarded Music Extension subject, which contributes to students' OP. We are fortunate to have a strong, skilled, and committed Year 11 cohort this year, and are able to offer a group of select students the opportunity to study this subject in 2018.

The Co-Curricular program continues to build and develop. We have continued to engage our skilled and committed instrumental teachers that are specialists in a range of instrument families: Mr Jeff Reid, our Woodwind teacher and Concert Band Conductor; Mr Malcolm Liddell, Brass teacher; Mr Andrew Mitchelson, Guitar teacher and Rock Band Convenor; Ms Roslyn Owens, voice teacher and Glee Club Convenor; Mr Cvitan Barac, Percussion teacher and Drum Line Conductor; and Ms Leisa Kirstein, Piano teacher. The Music Department is also excited to welcome Ms Elodie Mayberry to the College as our Strings teacher and String Ensemble Conductor.

As with every year, students of the Music Department contribute significantly to the cultural and spiritual life of the College. One of the first major performances for the school year was the opening of the new Marymount Parish church: Mary, Mother of Mercy. The College Vocal Ensemble joined with the Primary School Choir, Parish singers, and the boys from St Laurence's College, South Brisbane. The combined sound of male and female voices ranging from 7 to 70 years old was incredible, and truly a spiritual experience worthy of a Church Dedication.

Senior Music students were given the opportunity to travel to Brisbane to watch a performance of the Green Day musical, *American Idiot*. The non-stop rock show with a narrative of growing up in a post-911 world of love, loss, and acceptance, was thoroughly loved by all students in the Music classroom program, and has been a topic of conversation for the remainder of the year. We look forward to securing tickets to *Aladdin* for students studying classroom Music in 2018.

On the topic of musicals, 2017 was a "musical year", with staff and students combining to produce the highly successful Rock of Ages. Marymount College musical productions are often said to be one of the huge highlights of performing arts students' schooling lives, and the results are an outstanding triumph of epic proportions.

The Music Department is proud to nurture and foster its students' skills, knowledge, performing practice, and love of Music. I look forward to an exciting 2018, with the reintroduction of our award winning Jazz Ensemble, as well as our funk band making a comeback, ready for performance competition domination again.

#### Dance

## **Public Speaking**

Once again, Marymount College has been at the forefront of Gold Coast schools entering students in national public speaking competitions.

In Lions Youth of the Year, ten students represented the College. In the club judgings, Elly Ricketts won a Public Speaking Award; whilst Eshwin Rangesh was successful in winning through to the zone final, where he was then selected to proceed to the Gold Coast Regional Final.

In Rostrum *Voice of Youth*, seven students entered the competition, with Sophie Shaw and Molly Koschel winning at the first stage of the competition and progressing to the Gold Coast final.

It was the *Plain English Speaking Award* that brought the best results for College students. The school's two entrants in the competition, Eshwin Rangesh and Reece

Jackson, were the clear co-winners of the South East Queensland Zone Final and progressed to the Queensland State Final. Although neither was successful in the final, both won high praise from the adjudicators for their strong, incisive presentations.

Reece deserves even higher praise for his achievements resulting from his success in the *UN Youth Voice* Public Speaking Competition, a nationwide competition that is open to students in Years 7 -10. At the end of 2015, Reece was selected as a Queensland entrant in the National Final, held early last year. Since then he has participated in activities stemming from that final, and in July this year was selected to attend the Young Diplomats Tour, a month long tour around Europe in 2018. Reece was one of 16 Australian students selected for the tour from hundreds of applicants nationwide.

Last year, Year 7 student Mia Forbes matched Reece's success at state level in the competition when she gained selection in November for the National Final of the UN Competition. This was held in April this year. Currently, the College has five entrants in the 2017 competition.

We congratulate, not only those who have been successful, but all students who entered public speaking competitions this year, including those who entered *Lions Youth of the Year*, which has a significant public speaking element. They are to be commended for their hard work and their fine spirit in volunteering to take on what many people consider to be a most daunting endeavour.

We also express our sincere gratitude to the many parents and other family members who have supported our public speaking students, by attending the competitions and providing transport. Their assistance has been greatly appreciated.
