Car

Safety is our number 1 priority in the car park all parents, staff and students must obev the parking regulations. Police and Council will issue fines to drivers who participate in illegal and dangerous practices.

Reedy Creek Rd Pick-up & Parking Facility

- · Drivers using the 'Kiss & Go' have 30 seconds to pick-up or drop-off their children.
- · Students must be ready to exit the vehicle to the side walk immediately, with all they need to take with them.
- · At pick-up, if the child is not ready or present, drivers will be asked to move on and re-join the queue.
- · If parents need to exit the car for any reason, it is recommended that they park in the Reedy Creek Road public car park

Sunlight Drive Pick-up & Parking Facility

 A 'Kiss & Go' Drop off facility and an additional 114 carpark spaces are available, at the top of the Sunlight Drive entrance.

College Driveway Access

Please note the driveway between the College and Primary school Administration buildings is not accessible from 8.10am to 9.00am and also from 2.40pm to 3.10pm (Monday to Friday, during term times).

Bike

Riding your bike to school is a good way to increase your physical activity.

- · The Gold Coast Bike Riding Guide is a useful resource when talking to your child about bike safety
- There are many bike pathways in the area which lead into the school
- Students must lock their bikes up in the secure area under the Doyle Centre during the day with chain and lock.
- · Students riding bikes must obey all traffic laws which include wearing a helmet
- Students should not ride their bikes on The school premises.

E-Scooters

An e-scooter is classed as a Personal Mobility Device in Queensland and therefore the following laws apply:

- · To ride a personal mobility device, you must be either:
 - · At least 16 years old, or
 - At least 12 years old and supervised
 - by an adult while riding the device.
- · Children under 12 years of age must not ride personal mobility devices.

Tuckshop

The Tuckshop is open daily and serves breakfast from 8:00am.

For students convenience, the Tuckshop has EFTPOS facilities. We will accept either cash or card. Students are NOT permitted to use their mobile phones or smartwatch for payment at the Tuckshop.

Year 7 Camp

Year 7 students will attend Camp in the last week of Term 1.

This camp is an integral part of our College Induction Programme and has been designed to help develop your child through skills that are socially, mentally and physically challenging. The main aim of the camp is for the students to get to know one another and their teachers, as well as being the culminating activity of their Induction into Secondary School.

Parent Portal

Use the Parent Portal to notify an absence, view student information, reports, assessment schedules, excursion letters and more.

Parents will be able to access the Parent Portal 30 days before their child's enrolment commences and for 30 days after their enrolment finishes. An email with information on how to access will be sent to you early in the school year.

Record Book

Parents are asked to sign their child's record book weekly. It is a very important communication tool between school and home. Stamps are received in the record book for non-completion of homework and class work, and for not bringing the correct equipment to class. (3 stamps = letter home).

Email notifications will be sent advising parents if student's work habits in the areas of homework, equipment and classwork are of concern.

A notification will also be emailed if assignments are not submitted by the due date.

Absence from school

Providing Absence Notifications

This is important for the safety and wellbeing of all students. When a student cannot attend school for any reason, it is expected that the legal guardian will notify Student Reception by 8:00am on the day of absence.

Absence notifications are received via the methods below:

- Parent Portal: Click on Report Student Absence
- · BCE Connect App: Absences

SMS Messages

An SMS will be sent by approximately 9:30am each day to the main contact of students whose absence has not been notified by a parent or guardian.

If you are unwell during the day

Students who become unwell during the school day should:

- Inform their Class Teacher who will send them to Sick Bay
- Report to Sick Bay and show staff diary signed by teacher
- Staff in Sick Bay will call a parent to collect the student if necessary.

Students should NOT call their parents to collect them. If this is necessary, a staff member will contact a parent/caregiver.

Extended Absence

Marymount College does not support the practice of scheduling holidays during term time and does not consider the taking of a holiday during term time an authorised explanation of absence from school.

Requests for leave of absence for three or more days must be made via the Extended Absence link in the Parent Portal.

All requests for extended student absence must be made by a parent, two weeks in advance via the following method:

- · Log into the Parent Portal
- Select the 'Application for Extended Leave' icon
- · Complete the online form
- You will receive an automatic email confirming your request has been received.

While requests for leave of absence are necessary from time to time, students and parents must accept responsibility for the impacts their absence may have on their learning and achievement.

The Pastoral Leader - Year 7 will endeavour to assist the student, provided they make a timely and reasonable request for details of work and assessment prior to their absence. Special consideration will be given where necessary.

If your child is late for school (even if school has been notified) they must check in at SAO.


If your child will be arriving late, or needs to depart school early, a parent must advise via BCE Connect App or Parent Portal absence notifications.


We do not allow students to meet parents in the carpark, as this is unsupervised during the school day.

Please pull up outside SAO to collect your child. There is short term visitor parking in the driveway outside the Main Office.

Student Responsibilities

- To attend school for the whole school day, every day and be on time for all timetabled classes.
- To not leave school during school hours without a parent permission via the BCE Connect App or Parent Portal absence notifications and reporting to Student Administration Office (SAO) upon arrival/ prior to leaving.
- To always report to SAO if arriving to school later than 8:35am.
- To ensure work missed during any periods or days absent from school is completed.
- To monitor own attendance at the end of each term.
- To ensure days absent are explained by your Legal Guardian.
- To discuss day(s) absent with your class/Pastoral Care teacher if either attending regularly or getting your Legal Guardian's notification for an absence is difficult.
- Thursday sport is a timetabled class and is part of the Curriculum. All students are expected to participate.







Code of Expected Behaviour

Code of Expected Student Behaviour

As members of the Marymount College Community we commit to:

- show care and concern for ourselves and others through enjoying relationships that are courteous, just and respectful
- moving, working, learning and playing safely
- actively learning and assisting others with their learning
- communicating justly
- respect our own and others' property and the College environment.

These expectations are contained in the College Record Book and all College publications that deal with this area.

Behaviour Management

The basis of Marymount's Behaviour Management Structure is the use of the Positive Behaviour for Learning which is based on the principle that "no one has the right to violate the rights of others".

The rules that apply in all circumstances in our school are:

- · Bring the right thing
- · Do the right thing
- · Say the right thing.

In this way, students learn to show respect and use good manners so that the rights of others will not be violated.

In the classroom, this means the teacher's right to teach and a student's right to learn cannot be disrupted by the disruptive actions of others.

In the playground, this means every student's right to feel safe and free from harassment cannot be threatened by others. Each person is encouraged to use their gifts and talents fully.

Parent and Community Code of Conduct

We welcome parents and other members of our Marymount Community into our school. Working together in our school community, school staff support the learning and wellbeing of every student and are entitled to a safe work environment.

Parents and other visitors can support safety by ensuring their communications and conduct at the school and school activities are respectful. It is expected that parents and visitors to our school communities will:

- · be polite to others
- act as positive role models
- recognise and respect personal differences
- · contribute to a positive school culture
- use the school's communication process to address concerns
- work together with staff to resolve issues or concerns
- · respect peoples' privacy.

Parents and visitors to our school communities demonstrate this by:

- using polite spoken and written language
- · always speaking and behaving respectfully
- being compassionate when interacting with others
- informing staff if the behaviour of others is negatively impacting them or their family
- respecting staff time by accepting they will respond to appropriate communication when they are able
- requesting a meeting to discuss any concerns about their child's education, allowing staff time to prepare and appreciating their time may be limited
- acknowledging staff are responsible for supporting the whole school community
- speaking positively about the school and its staff
- not making negative comments or gossiping about other school community members, including students - in person, in writing or on social media
- understanding, at times, compromises may be necessary
- always considering the privacy of all school community members and understanding that the school cannot share confidential information.

Complaints Policy

Marymount College applies the following principles when managing complaints:

- Students, parents and guardians
- have a right to voice complaints.
- Complaints are resolved promptly
- and at the point of receipt, where
- · possible.
- Complaints will be handled fairly,
- · objectively, and confidentially.
- Students, parents and guardians will

How to make a complaint

- In the first instance, the student, parent or guardian talks with a teacher or other school employee and they work together to resolve the complaint.
- 2. If the matter cannot be resolved, the student, parent or guardian talks with a senior school employee e.g. Head of Year, Deputy Principal, Assistant Principal or other nominated school employee and they work together to resolve the complaint.
- 3. If the matter cannot be resolved, the student, parent or guardian talks with the Principal and they work together to resolve the complaint.

Request for review

If dissatisfied with the school's complaints processes, a student, parent or guardian may submit a written request for a review to the Principal.

Uniform Policy

The Marymount College Uniform Policy is an agreed dress standard for all students attending Marymount.

The Marymount College uniform policy has been developed through a thorough consultation with parents, staff and the wider community. The policy also covers other aspects of the personal presentation of students, especially as ambassadors of the College and its name.

The Marymount College Uniform Policy applies to all students when:

- Attending or representing our school
- · Travelling to and from school
- Engaging in school activities out of school hours, including school excursions
- Wearing of the College uniform inside or outside of school hours

The Marymount College Uniform Policy aims to contribute to a safe, disciplined and supportive learning environment through:

- Ready identification of students at school
- · Fostering a strong sense of belonging
- Developing mutual respect among students by minimising visible evidence of an economic or social difference
- · Being sun-smart
- Being respectful of the College community and its reputation

It is expected that:

- Students will be role models of College values in word, deed and action in the College uniform.
- The College uniform will be worn in its entirety and not with non-approved items.
- The College uniform will be worn in accordance with all aspects of the Uniform Code.
- The College uniform must be kept clean, neat and in a good state of repair.
- Students will not harm the reputation of the College while wearing the uniform.
- Students will not upload, through the use of any data carriage service, images and videos of themselves, or others, in the College uniform to any digital platform.

Free dress days

Free dress days are generally part of a celebration, fundraising activity or sporting event.

Examples include:

- St Patrick's Day, Have a Heart Day, Marymount Day
- Swimming Carnival, Track & Field Carnival
- Camps

The following rules will apply on free dress days:

- Clothing, jewellery or other items must not be offensive, unsafe, revealing or likely to disrupt the normal school management
- · Shoes must be enclosed
- · Long hair must be tied back
- · Normal jewellery and make-up rules apply

Special circumstances

The Marymount College Uniform Policy incorporates strategies to accommodate the special needs and circumstances of students.

These needs are negotiated between parents, Head of Year and the Assistant Principal Pastoral Care. Examples of special circumstances may include:

- · Student medical conditions
- Student physical attributes or requirements
- · Sport and PE

Representing the College

Students representing the College in sport are required to wear full sports or their team uniform to and from the venue.

If the sport has a special training shirt and/or team uniform, this is permitted to be worn at training and before/after school.

Health & Physical Education (HPE)

Students not wearing the correct uniform, shoes or hat for HPE lessons will receive a PBR referral after 3 breaches per term.

Request for uniform variations

- Students require a note written by their parent/carer to seek a uniform variation.
- The note is to be presented to their Head of Year (HOY) upon arrival at school.
- If granted, the student receives a uniform variation slip, signed by their HOY.

Chewing gum

Chewing gum is not permitted at Marymount College.

Hair

- For all students, hair should be neat, clean and tidy.
- Hair should not be cut or coloured in an unusual or extreme way, be shaved at less than a 3 or have lines or patterns.
- Mullet and undercut haircuts are not permitted.
- Students with unusual or extreme hair will not be permitted to return to the College until the colour is removed or the cut is more acceptable.
- When leaning forward the hair should not obscure the face.
- Students with hair longer than the top of the collar should be tied back.
- Beards, goatees, moustaches, rattails or long sideburns are not permitted.
- Patterned scrunchies, hair ties, and ribbons are not permitted.

Jewellery, make-up, and piercings

- Students are not permitted to wear makeup.
- False eyelashes are not to be worn to school.
- No jewellery is to be worn except for a plain wristwatch, or a plain cross which may be worn with an appropriate chain.
- Students may wear one plain stud or small sleeper in each lower ear lobe.
- Large, jewelled studs or drop earrings are not permitted.
- Lip, nose, eyebrow, tongue and other visible piercings are not permitted.
- Clear piercings are not permitted under any circumstances, nor is it allowable to cover a piercing with a band-aid.

Tattoos

Visible tattoos are not permitted.

Fingernails

Fingernails should be clean and presentable. Students should not wear false nails of any kind. Nails should be free of coloured polish. Clear polish is acceptable.

Sanctions

Our school community supports the application of the following sanctions for breaches of the Marymount College Uniform Policy.

These include:

- 1. Uniform Detention
- Students in breach of the Uniform Policy will be issued with a uniform detention.
- Students who fail to attend their uniform detention receive a PBR for not following teacher directions.
- Failure to attend the PBR results in a suspension.
- Preventing students from attending or participating in any activity or event for which they are representing the school.
- Providing verbal and/or written communication to parents/carers of students who do not meet the requirements of the College Uniform Policy.
- 4. Withdrawal and suspension.

Sun Safe Policy

Students will:

- be aware of the school's Sun Smart Policy
- take responsibility for their own health and safety by being Sun Smart
- use shaded or covered areas, where possible, for outdoor activities
- comply with Sun Smart rules and guidelines by wearing suitable hats, clothing, sunscreen apply SPF 30 broad-spectrum, water-resistant sunscreen 20 minutes before going outdoors
- act as positive role models for other students in all aspects of Sun Smart behaviour

Formal Uniform

The full school uniform is to be worn whilst travelling to and from school (except on designated sports days) and at all College functions. The uniform is to be worn well fitted, clean and in good condition.

This policy ensures that Smart device use during school hours is managed in a consistent way. It also ensures that students, parents/carers and teachers all understand the rules of the College regarding the use of Smart devices during school hours and, in particular, learning time.

The College accepts no responsibility for the security of Smart devices.

- The Smart device must be turned off and secured in the student's locker when the student arrives at school.
- Students are permitted to check messages briefly during breaks at their lockers
- Teacher permission is granted for use in the relevant class only.

- Safe keeping of Smart devices is the responsibility of the owner.
- The use of the Smart device, within the scope of this policy, is during the normal hours of the school day 8:00am to 3:00pm.
- Please note that this policy includes no Smart devices in the Library from 8:00am to 3:30pm.
- Misuse outside these hours, but while on school premises will fall within the scope of the Student Behaviour Support Plan of the College.

In Class Use

- School Rule: Smart devices, if brought to school, are to be kept in the student's locker during school hours.
- The device must be turned off, unless permission is granted to use during class time. In such instances the class teacher will liaise with the Head of Department and will notify all staff members of the use of Smart devices by students in that lesson.

Year 7-9 Assessment Policy

Below is an excerpt of the Junior Assessment Policy.

An Assessment may be in the form of:

- An assignment completed during school time or at home.
- An exam which is a written piece of work or a practical (that may be performance based) supervised by a teacher, completed in class time and designed to evaluate knowledge and skills covering contents of a subject.

Assignment Principles

- Students must keep a copy of all assignments submitted electronically on OneDrive.
- Written scripts must be submitted for orals on the due date. The order of presentation will be decided by the teacher.
- Students must be present on the set day and be prepared to present.

- If a task sheet specifies a due date for submitting a draft, students must submit two copies of the draft, one of which will be returned with feedback. Teachers will keep the other copy.
- Students should always have some evidence of work in progress to show to their teacher if necessary.

Plagiarism

Plagiarism involves students submitting the work of others as their own, without appropriate acknowledgment or referencing of the original work. Where there is clear evidence of plagiarism, credit will only be given for work that has been identified as the student's own work.

Year 7-9 Homework Policy

Homework is any work or activity which students are asked to do outside lesson time.

The Purpose of Homework is to:

- · help students deepen their knowledge
- help students to develop fluency
 introduced and incomplete in the students in the stu
- introduce content to students in preparation to learn new content
- extend school learning through additional reading
- work on projects and assignments or prepare oral presentations
- encourage students to become independent learners.

Student's Responsibility is to:

- take their Record Books to every class and record homework in it
- · accept that deadlines must be kept.

Parent's/Carer's Responsibility is to:

- support students with their homework but accept that their role will become less and less important as students become more responsible and independent
- make it clear to students that they value homework
- check the Record Book at least once a week
- encourage students to meet homework deadlines.

If parents/carers feel that insufficient or too much homework is being set, they should contact the class teacher who will respond to the situation. If necessary the Curriculum Leader will also investigate the situation.

Non Completion of Homework

 When homework has not been done, appropriate action will be taken by the classroom teacher.

- The teacher will 'stamp' the Record Book in order to alert the parents/carers that homework has not been completed for a particular subject. If the student receives three stamps for a subject, the Curriculum Leader will contact the Assistant Principal who will alert the parents/carers that further action may be necessary.
- Homework should not prevent students from participating in an activity after school such as sport, music, clubs of any kind or family commitments. Students should plan such activities to allow time to complete homework.

Homework Club

This support is provided from 3.00pm - 4.00pm on Thursdays. Students are welcome to utilise as much of that time as is required. There is no need to make a booking, students may just come to the Library.

Maths Tutoring

Maths Tutoring is available for all students on Friday during lunchtimes in Room A2. Students can work on homework, or assignments and receive help from Maths Teachers.

Library & Resource Centre

The Library and Resource Centre provides easily accessible, relevant resources to support student learning.

Library staff are available to offer guidance to students in completing their research assignments and locating appropriate resources both online and from the book collection. We encourage students to be cooperative, critical thinkers and problemsolvers who make informed decisions. Our Makerspace allows dynamic learning of a self-driven kind, inspiring students to succeed and boosting their confidence in hands-on learning.





Religious Education

At Marymount College a Catholic view about Learning and Teaching is reflected in both dimensions of Religious Education, namely, the classroom teaching and learning of religion and the Religious Life of the School.

We draw upon the Catholic Christian tradition in ways that are mindful of local contexts and the ecumenical and multi-faith realities of contemporary culture. Students at Marymount College are expected to participate fully in the Religious Education Program. This includes the formal in-class work and the broader religious life of the College (Reflection Days off campus, Liturgies, Prayer Life, Feasts and Celebrations. Outreach and Social Justice).

Religious Education is a compulsory subject and is studied for six periods per fortnight. Students are expected to complete set tasks encouraging them to be lifelong learners and to develop their religious literacy. The Religious Education program at Marymount College has been prepared in accordance with Archdiocesan guidelines and approved by the Brisbane Archdiocesan Accreditation panel. It is not static and continues to develop to meet the students' needs.

Students are provided with opportunities to demonstrate overall performance according to the year level achievement standard and learning intentions. Performance is monitored and recorded in student folios. The four strands studied are: Beliefs, Church, Christian Life and Sacred Texts. Course content is integrated across the four strands and designed appropriately for the Marymount College context.

English

The Year 7 English program is developed in accordance with the Australian National Curriculum and is built around the three interrelated strands of Language, Literature and Literacy.

Each of the program's four units is designed to develop students' knowledge, understanding and skills in preparation for their senior years of schooling.

Students read, view, and create a range of texts designed to inform, influence, and engage audiences. They will learn to identify how ideas are portrayed in texts, as well as how texts are influenced by context.

Students will also consider the way in which text structures and language features shape meaning in texts. An increased level of challenge is built into tasks throughout each year as students move through their middle years of schooling. These tasks are purposefully aligned with the text structures and cognitive demands of the senior ATAR system.

Technical control of language is emphasised through a strong focus on grammar, vocabulary, spelling and expression.
Students learn how to master writing for a particular purpose and audience.
Comprehension is also an integral part of the English program in the middle years, with students developing their skills in literal, inferential and evaluative understanding.

The English program is designed to assist students to become self-directed learners. Feedback is purposefully shaped to help them develop independence in editing and refining ideas.

Health & Physical Education

In Health and Physical Education at Marymount College students develop the knowledge, understanding and skills to strengthen their sense of self and build and manage satisfying relationships.

As students mature, they develop and use critical inquiry skills to research and analyse the knowledge of the field and to understand the influences on their own and others' health, safety and wellbeing.

A healthy, active population improves productivity and personal satisfaction, promotes pro-social behaviour and reduces the occurrence of chronic disease. History and Geography

In Year 7, History will be studied in Semester 1 and Geography will be studied in Semester 2.

History

The Year 7 History Curriculum provides a study of history from the time of the earliest human communities to the end of the ancient period, approximately 60,000 years ago - c.650 (CE), and a study of early First Nations Peoples of Australia. It was a period defined by the development of cultural practices and organised societies.

The study of Ancient Rome includes the discoveries (the remains of the past and what we know) and the mysteries (what we do not know) about this period of history.

Geography

The Geography course covers two units. Water in the World examines the many uses of water, its value as a resource, its scarcity, the water cycle and specific water hazards. The Place and Liveability unit examines factors that influence liveability, including the services and facilities needed to support and enhance our lives. It develops students' ability to evaluate the liveability of their own suburb and to investigate whether it can be improved through planning.

Mathematics

Mathematics is organised around the interaction of six content strands and four proficiency strands, following the Australian Curriculum. The proficiency strands are Understanding, Fluency, Problem Solving and Reasoning. These strands describe how content is explored or developed, that is, the thinking and doing of mathematics.

The Mathematics curriculum provides the opportunity to apply mathematical understanding and skills in context, both in other learning areas and in real world contexts.

Students develop the capacity to recognise and understand the role of mathematics in the world around them and the confidence, willingness and ability to apply mathematics to their lives. All students will be exposed to content and experiences in all strands which will develop understanding and higher order thinking processes necessary for the more difficult mathematics subjects in senior school.

Year 7 students take learning into their own hands with the support of several online resources. The additional support to classroom activities allows students to develop their autonomy, problem-solving and ability to work independently. Online platforms, such as Mathspace are relevant to 21st century learners with attention grabbing-activities and stimulating challenges.

Science

In Year 7, students explore the diversity of life on Earth and continue to develop their understanding of the role of classification in ordering and organising information. They use and develop models such as food chains and food webs to represent and analyse the flow of energy and matter through ecosystems and explore the impact of changing components within these systems.

They consider the interaction between multiple forces when explaining changes in an object's motion. They explore partical theory and consider how the arrangement of the motion of particles in a substance changes it's properties. They investigate relationships in the Earth-sun-moon system and use models to predict and explain events. Students make accurate measurements and control variables to analyse relationships between system components. They explore and explain these relationships through appropriate representations and consider the role of science in decision-making processes.

By the end of Year 7, students describe techniques to separate pure substances from mixtures. They represent and predict the effects of unbalanced forces, including Earth's gravity, on motion. They explain how the relative positions of Earth, the sun and moon affect phenomena on Earth. They analyse how the properties of a substance are determined by the rules of particle theory.

Students will predict the effect of human and environmental changes on interactions between organisms and classify and organise diverse organisms based on observable differences.

The Year 7 curriculum provides students the opportunity to describe how decisions are made to allocate limited resources to individuals and communities in an economy. They describe the reasons businesses exist and the types of businesses, identify how entrepreneurial characterisites contirbute to the success of a business.

They describe the reasons individuals choose to work, how they derive an income and types of work that exist.

Students develop questions to investigate an economic and business issue. They locate, select and organise data and information from sources. They use this to interpret decisions and finally develop a response.

Students will be introduced to computational problem solving, using algorithms to develop automation systems for potential entry to RoboCup Junior Robotics competition. They will investigate how data is transmitted and secured in networks to develop their own transmission and receiver devices.

Students will also engage with cybersecurity, interacting with a simulated social media account to determine data leaks. They will reflect on the information shared publicly through social media and the problems this may cause.

Music

Music is offered to students of all ability levels. It is designed to foster creativity and enjoyment by connecting students' own experiences with music in their lives, to meeting the curriculum elements. Students study a range of modern and classical musical styles, performance techniques, and traditional and modern composition techniques with an emphasis on technology. The Music Department is well-resourced with instruments and technology to inspire students, and instil a love and appreciation of music in all its forms.

Through the syllabus objective of composing, students learn basic skills using technology to compose a structured piece of electronic music using loops and GarageBand. This is accompanied by the study of an EDM song so as to inform composition work. The performance objective allows students to learn and experience basic skills on keyboard and guitar, with occasional branching into bass guitar, and drum kit. Students study a piece of modern rock music, and are guided to learn how to play this piece on an instrument of their choosing.

- Studying Classroom Music can also provide students with a creative and structured outlet to offset an academic plan with other STEM subjects. Students in previous years who have studied subjects such as Mathematical Methods, Specialist Mathematics, Chemistry, and Physics have also studied Music and Music Extension, and often greatly appreciated this balance in their subject load

Registration for ensembles incurs a once per term payment of \$100 regardless of the number of ensembles a student is involved in. This levy contributes to the costs associated with choirs, ensembles and bands; however, the College continues to heavily subsidise these costs. Please note, students must re-enrol for ensembles at the commencement of each year.

Instrumental Bursaries

The bursary recognises a student's prior musical achievements and experiences, exemplary attitudes, and demonstration to be an active contributor to the College's Music Department. Successful applicants will be awarded either a full or half bursary at the discretion of the College.

- The Full Bursary covers the cost of private lesson tuition on one instrument for the remainder of the current year.
- The Half Bursary covers half of the cost of private lesson tuition on one instrument for the remainder of the current year.

Bursaries are active for the current year only. Previous applicants need to reapply each year. Bursaries for 2026 will open end of in Term 4 2025.
