RELIGIOUS EDUCATION, MISSION AND CAMPUS MINISTRY

This report to the Marymount College Community provides an overview of the life of the school, the achievements of students and of our plans and progress as we continually strive to make Marymount the best school possible.

It adds to the Annual School reporting required by legislation available on our Website. (Select 'About Us' for these reports). It is also available on Brisbane Catholic Education's Public website by selecting the Schools' Directory to find Marymount College. Data from 2010 reporting is included as Appendix I and II.

ENROLMENTS

The College enrolment contracted in 2011 as financial pressures adversely impacted our families. This, combined with the smaller cohorts at our traditional Catholic Feeder schools in 2010, has seen enrolment at 1040 students at the Term 3 Census. Enrolment for 2012 is expected to be unchanged and we remain optimistic about enrolment demand in coming years.

Tightness is expected for Year Eight places in 2013 and 2014. The announcement that Year 7 will move to Secondary schools in 2015 has generated much interest and will see further enrolment growth. Planning has already begun in terms of proposed College facilities and 2012-2013 will see further planning for the arrival of Year 7 to consider their needs, and curriculum and human resource implications. Prospective parents are encouraged to attend our Marymount Tours, held each Term to find out more about our plans and our enrolment timelines and be assured that Marymount is the best secondary school option for their child. Enrolments are expected to grow to just over 1300 students in the long term.

Central to what we are about is the formation of young men and women who will go from school and continue to be inspired by Jesus' message as Christians, faithful to the core Catholic teaching to love God and to love others. We have a wonderful democracy and Catholic schools have contributed to this by educating fine Christian men and women who have been critical in making Australia the great nation that it is. We strive to ensure that this will continue to be so as we campaign to ensure appropriate levels of Government funding for Catholic schools.

Through our Religious Education programs we teach students about God, we nurture their spirituality and we teach them how to pray. Students learn about the Catholic Christian tradition. They participate in camps and retreats; and everyday relationships between students, staff and parents are expected to reflect Gospel values, the gracious abundance of Mary and the peace and goodwill of St Francis.

In a very practical way our students contributed to the community. This year they raised over \$10,000 for flood affected families of Christ the King primary school Graceville, Project Compassion, Rosies, Cancer Research, Catholic Missions and more. Prayer before school, at Year level and College Assemblies, for times of great loss (in Norway and Logan City), during Easter, on Marymount Day and the Feast of St Francis reassured, affirmed and reminded us of God's goodness and our purpose. Staff commitment to faith development and the spirituality of students is clear. Most staff teach Religious Education, they generously ensure staffing of retreats and attend to maintaining their formal qualifications to teach in a Catholic School as a matter of course.











Mrs Bernadette Roche has stood down from her position as Assistant Principal Religious Education due to illness. When she is well Bernadette will return to the teaching staff. Mrs Dolores Maitland, who has acted in the role of APRE for some time, has been appointed to the position from the start of 2012. We thank Dolores, and Kaylene Langford our Campus Minister, for their leadership and example in Mission and faith this year. We thank our College Captains, Matthew Williams and Kate Boladian and the College Student Leaders for ensuring enthusiasm, generosity and goodwill among the students by their leadership and example.

In an endeavour to extend our College Mission into the hearts and minds of families, teachers in Year Eight considered the College Vision for Learning and how it might apply as a Vision for being a good person (like Jesus, Mary, St Francis). The simple idea is that, what we do shapes who we become: being honest and reliable produces integrity; being kind and understanding produces graciousness; being humble and appreciative produces generosity. The real challenge in life is to be mindful of what character traits we would like to develop because what we do will shape our character. Christian belief, enthusiasm, generosity and goodwill start in the home, are reinforced at the College and, we trust, will be taken up in life by each of our graduates.


CURRICULUM

The College has comprehensive curriculum offerings that allow students to choose combinations of subjects to suit their many tertiary aspirations or post school vocational education pathways. Student choices ensure increasing compatibility of study interests as students progress beyond Year 9. As a result, our students are able to focus their study and excel in their particular courses, whether that's in mathematics and science, the humanities, the arts, or any of the diverse vocational









pathways. Catering for student interests and meeting their learning needs ensures outstanding success for serious students. The quality of outcomes is evident in the Next Step 2011 Report, the 2010 Senior Outcomes Report, the 2010 and 2011 NAPLAN results and the 2011 College Awards.

Principal's Awards were given for academic excellence and for outstanding effort following school reporting at the end of Term One and Semester One. The demanding criteria, and the number of students receiving awards, confirms the quality of student engagement across the Senior and Middle Years. The College Awards Night further celebrates the fine work of our students and clearly reflects a parent community encouraging their sons and daughters and supporting the College.

Senior Tertiary Pathways

The consistent high standing of the College's Senior Academic Program was confirmed with over 46% of seniors going on to tertiary degree level study. A summary of the Next Step Report for 2010 follows. 43% of OP students graduated with an OP between 1 and 10, the bands that ensure University entrance. 78% achieved an OP between 1-15. 98% graduated with the Queensland Certificate of education, an Apprenticeship or Traineeship (SAT) or VET Certificates. See Appendix I and II.



College Dux Lily Fogg received national recognition for academic excellence with the Australian Student Prize 2010. Lily is one of 500 exceptional students who received this national prize.

She received a certificate and \$2000 to mark her outstanding achievement. Lily is now doing very well at Griffith University, where she is completing a Bachelor of Medical Science.

Her mother, and her teachers at Marymount are very proud of her.























Careers and Vocational Education

In addition to nationally accredited Certificate Courses the College maintains a Careers and VET Office as part of the Vocational Education Program. The office provides many services, brokering pathways that help students transition through school and beyond. These include career advice, industry placement and School based Apprenticeship and Traineeship support. The annual Careers Expo held in July is the public centrepiece of operations each year. It involves all universities and colleges from South East Queensland and Northern New South Wales, representatives from the Emergency Services and the Defence Forces and over one hundred local industry and business representatives.

The Careers Office supports Information Evenings, the Year 10 Career Development Program and activities within VET Course work. Its services, which are integral to the needs of students as they plan for their future at school and beyond, included:

- > Advertising and brokering over 77 School-based Apprenticeships or Traineeships across Hospitality, retail, hairdressing, business, sports, building and Construction, Automotive;
- > Work experience for 271 students, including all Year 11 and for individuals in Years 9, 10 and 12 where needed;
- > Monitoring workplace training for 27 Structured Workplace Training students one day each week;
- > Brokering student enrolments in alternative courses with other training providers (including: Fitness, Multimedia, Children's Services, Tourism, Live Production, Theatre and Events);
- > Assistance with SET planning, Senior subject selection, QTAC and Scholarship applications and University & TAFE Direct Entry (46 students received direct entry to TAFE in 2011).

Congratulations to Kristina Grzic, Courtney Hutchins, Cassandra Jackson and Ellen Sawdy who received 2011 Australian Vocational Student Prizes. The Prize recognises the achievements of students who have completed their senior secondary studies while undertaking a VET schools program or an Australian Schoolbased Apprenticeship. The students each receive a Certificate and \$2000.

We thank Mr Michael Murtagh, Vocational Education and Careers Coordinator, and School Officers, Ms Petrina James and Ms Leesa Lutze for their outstanding service to students in this area.

Middle Years

Our curriculum leaders and teachers appreciate that the Australian Curriculum can bring clarity and continuity with regard to syllabus content in the junior years. Already significant trialing across the phase 1 learning areas of English, Mathematics, Science and History is happening. By 2012 English, Mathematics and Science will be taught across Year Eight to Ten using the Australian Curriculum. By 2013 History will be taught across Year Eight to Ten using the Australian Curriculum. By 2014 all four phase 1 learning areas will be taught across Year Eight to Ten using the Australian Curriculum.

The achievement of Year 9 students in NAPLAN continues to affirm the calibre of our students and the quality of teaching and learning. Results for Numeracy and Writing are well above State Averages. Spelling needs attention. Grammar, Punctuation and Reading will also be included as we strive to match the exceptional results in Numeracy and Writing.

We are very appreciative of the work of Ms Natalie Collins (Assistant Principal - Senior Curriculum), Mrs Marie Hansen (Assistant Principal – Junior Curriculum) and the Academic Heads of Department, Subject Coordinators and teachers for their vital curriculum leadership. We have strong faculties at Marymount and this faculty culture permeates teaching and learning ensuring high quality teaching and a balance of care and academic demand.

LEARNING SUPPORT CENTRE

Our Learning Support Centre leads the College commitment to inclusive teaching and learning practices. The Centre provides teaching services, in-class teacher aide support to targeted students, and facilitates teacher professional development to increase awareness of student needs. Resourcing was increased this year with Mrs Di King joining the Support Teacher Team.

Following a review of the needs of students with disabilities last year Mrs Annette McMahon has begun a program of in-service for staff. This will result in ongoing in-service each year focusing on particular disabilities and needs of students for all staff. At the same time the Centre facilitates small group in-service with teachers of particular students. Often, the strategies necessary to support these students also benefit many others in the classroom.

Many students visit the Centre to receive direct assistance, to work on assignments and to use the computer facilities. Centre



staff also volunteer to help students prepare for contests such as Opti-minds, Debating and Maths Olympiad. They also lead the popular Homework Club after school, where students can get teacher assistance across the full range of subjects.

Our appreciation goes to Coordinator, Mrs Annette McMahon, Support Teachers, Mrs Sue Barlow and Mrs Di King and to all our hard working teacher aide staff.

PASTORAL CARE

We strive to be a supportive learning environment, committed to life-giving learning and life-giving relationships. This is reflected in the tone of the school and interactions with staff, students, and parents. We are told by graduating seniors that they love their school and don't want to leave. While they do move on, each year we hold ten year reunions. Many returned in June this year for their 1971, 1981, 1991 and 2001 reunion.

Student leadership is strongly promoted throughout the school and this is especially evident in the training provided to student leaders, and in their valuable contribution to student life. It is also reflected in the Student-Teacher Advisory Council (STAC), the body through which our Year 8 to 11 students make their contribution to school life including the STAC Cup. The Peer Mentoring Program involving Year 11 volunteer mentors working with Year 8 students continued this year. The Year 8 students appreciate the support and respect of the older students and the senior students welcome the chance to have responsibility.

We are fortunate to have the services of three Guidance Counsellors at the College. Dr Angela Jeffery, Mrs Heather Clark and Dr Jessica Joyce provide important short-term assistance for students and monitor their needs. Mrs Sandra Devine replaced Mrs Clark during her leave this year. In addition, Mrs Norette Mitchell, (Home-school Liaison Officer) continued her vital role of parent support. The 'Nyunga Centre' also continues to provide (longer term) counselling services to all Gold Coast Catholic schools from its base in the College's old Convent. The valuable work of the Centre is the result of our partnership with Brisbane Catholic Education and Griffith University.

The College Student Behaviour Support Policy, which includes our Anti-Bullying Policy ensures open, transparent and accountable practices and procedures in supporting student learning and addressing inappropriate student behaviour. The Responsible Thinking Process devised by Ed Ford ensures most students resolve issues without parent or administration intervention. The process and key staff including, Miss Jodie Young, Mrs Terri-Lea Johnston and the Pastoral Coordinators, support students who need help. Many students never do. Most students who do, quickly work out what the expectations are and how to resolve issues with their teachers when they have a problem. A small number of students struggle and parents, pastoral coordinators and administration have to become involved.

We particularly acknowledge Mr Kyle Connor (Deputy Principal) and Mr Geoffrey Browne (Assistant Principal - Pastoral), for the exceptional way they have provided leadership in Pastoral Care as they settled into their new roles. With Miss Young they have ensured the smooth and effective implementation of changes to staffing of the Responsible Thinking Classroom. Their considered approach and highly effective, close working relationship with our Year Level Pastoral Coordinators and Assistant Pastoral Coordinators is essential and they have been warmly welcomed by all students and staff in their first year at the College as a result.





























INFORMATION COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGIES

The Digital Education Revolution continued with the roll out of laptops to a second year level. Certainly students in Year 8, 11 and 12 students were understanding beyond measure as Year 9 and 10 students enjoyed 24/7 computer access. Laptops will be issued to Year 8 and 9 students in February next year. The consolation for Year 12 will be significantly improved access to desktop computers each day.

The overall impact of this change will not be clear for some time. Certainly the variety and quality of resources accessible to students in Year 9 and 10 has increased. At the same time the nature of student tasks is evolving and the capacity to research expanding. Students are developing increased typing skills and software knowledge. The rate of these increases for individual students is probably highly variable. No doubt for the inquisitive and engaged students the laptop is a boon. For the passive and distractable student the laptop may not be so helpful. More needs to be done supporting teachers and providing professional development, particularly to help with regard to self-management of personal computers and maintaining links to software packages and networks. It is expected that the appointment of an eLearning Coordinator in July and additional provision of \$26,000 for staff Professional Development in 2011-2012 will address some of the issues.

At the same time the evolution of teaching and learning to capture opportunities and to validly assess is providing new challenges. It is a challenge that has arrived at the same time the Australian Curriculum is being implemented. The Australian Curriculum and current research on school improvement, external assessment processes such as QCS and NAPLAN, clearly point to the continued relevance of explicit teaching and assessment. While teaching and learning must embrace the new and exciting ways to explore, collaborate, create and present knowledge and information, mandatory testing remind teachers and students of the basics.

SCHOOL INFORMATION SYSTEM CHANGE

Term 4 saw the completion of a change of the College's School Information System to integrated software systems: Timetabler, eMinerva and Dynamics AX. The move to Timetabler was achieved as we started the year following considerable work by Mr Hurley, Mrs Collins and Mrs Hansen from September last year as they set subject groups and timetabled classes for this year.

The roll over to eMinerva and Dynamics AX was delayed until the end of Term 3. Great care has been taken to ensure that student/family data (eMinerva) and financial data (Dynamics AX) has been fully and accurately transferred.

eMinerva promises advantages for student/family data processes and for future linking of class groups to online learning resources. Adjusting to the new systems menus to access data will be ongoing through Term 4 and may result in changes to practices. On-line roll marking and SMS messaging to parents of absent students will be implemented in the future.



















BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Before school resumed our Open Rugby league players, parents, coach and manager, with the assistance of Mr Turner and Mr Boyes, installed upgraded lockers throughout the Year 12 area. This disbursment of the lockers and the provision of picnic table seating by the P & F in the open spaces created greatly improved the amenity of the area and was very well received when the seniors returned for school.

The Year 11 Area Project was completed as school resumed. Total cost for the project was \$130,000 with the Parents and Friends contributing \$85,000. Concept Plans have been approved for shade sails, cover around E Block, a new storage shed and the removal of the demountables in this area. Tenders are now being invited to design and construct these facilities to complete our overall plan for the area extending from the tennis courts to the Year 11 area.

In May/June Valdon Constructions completed a \$30,000 covered area as part of the Mary MacKillop Building. This area now houses the new Year 10 Lockers. These were also installed by our 'in house' Installation Team. The area appears to function well. Valdon Construction also completed the \$160,000 refurbishment of Lab E21. This brought the lab up to the standard of the five laboratories in the Mary MacKillop Building.


Refurbishment of the Theatrette and Doyle Centre Foyer was completed by early August. This was a joint project with Marymount Primary School at a total cost of just over \$125,000. We are pleased with the outcome.

As term 2 closed, work began by Fardouly's Constructions on the \$3.3 million Art and Technology Building. This work is on schedule. The roof will be completed shortly and the art and technology rooms will be available as school resumes in 2012. With just \$389,000 State Government Assistance this project adds significantly to our debt burden.

Among minor works also completed were the installation of drainage in pathways from the front carpark to finally get rid of the puddles that ruined shoes as it ruined visitor's impressions; parking signage at admin to finally secure vacant parks for parents coming for appointments; \$13,000 gum removal project to clear and refresh all areas; provision of additional curtains and air conditioning to particular rooms.

Our endeavor, supported by the Parents and Friends, is to ensure high quality facilities for all classes to develop outdoor precincts with good amenity for students at each year level. The College master plan envisages the demolition of all S Block Buildings when the Year 7, 8, 9 Building is complete and a Covered area in front of the Mary MacKillop Building for these year groups. This work, or perhaps something similar will transform the College amenity.

The combined schools have borrowed to pay a total of \$1,314,096 for the removal of the power lines. They were removed before school resumed at the start of the year. The easement is now available and the proposed Year 7, 8, 9 Block will encroach into the easement. The College still has an outstanding debt for the removal of the power lines of \$211,960. The power line levy will continue to pay off this debt for a further four years.









SCHOOL RENEWAL

The College Vision for Learning was published as the year began. The work of the Year Eight students on school culture and developing character was based on the Vision for Learning, which is now included in correspondence to parents/guardians regarding their son's/daughter's referrals to the Responsible Thinking Classroom.

Our Vision for Learning is that through positive, active engagement we become a successful learner; and the bottom line that supports this: high expectations and high quality teaching. Through Year 8 pastoral and RE classes we have tried to extend this to suggest to all that we will only become gracious people of peace and goodness if they are generous, caring and doing good deeds.

The ICLT RE Action Research Project in Year 9 aimed to engage students to communicate, collaborate and create information and develop knowledge and skills using their laptops. Students have more control of their learning and grades have improved. As a result of skills developed among teachers and students there has been an extension from this project into history and geography. We thank Mrs Dolores Maitland, Ms Therese Mullins and Mrs Jacqui Sheehan for their leadership.

Action Research Work by members of the English department led by Mrs Christine Miro focused on student writing, editing and redrafting. This project resulted in new resources for students and increased the responsibility of students for proofreading, editing and re-drafting. Among teachers there was a sense of improved teaching practice because of the new resources created, because students had to take more responsibility for developing writing skills and because student writing improved.

NEXT STEP 2011: STUDENT DESTINATIONS (SUMMARY)

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In 2011, 67.4 per cent of young people who completed their Year 12 at Marymount College in 2010 continued in some recognised form of education and training in the year after they left school.


The most common study destination was university (46.1 per cent). The combined VET study destinations accounted for 21.3 per cent of respondents, including 14.2 per cent in campus-based VET programs, with 9.2 per cent of Year 12 completers entering programs at Certificate IV level or higher.

7.1 per cent commenced employment-based training, either as an apprentice (6.4 per cent) or trainee (0.7 per cent).

In addition to the above study destinations, a further 3.5 per cent of respondents from this school deferred a tertiary offer in 2011 (deferrers are shown in Figure 1 in their current destination).

32.6 per cent did not enter post-school education or training, and were either employed (23.4 per cent), seeking work (7.1 per cent) or neither studying nor in the labour force (2.1 per cent).
